Advent is the liturgical season of penitential but joyful anticipation and a time to prepare our hearts for the arrival of our long awaited Savior. It is also one of our family's favorite seasons of the liturgical year and one that we begin observing with our children from their earliest days through traditions like the Advent Wreath.

As the beginning of the new Church Year, Advent also provides Catholics a fresh start, and therefore the perfect opportunity to incorporate new spiritual devotions and disciplines within our families. The 4 week length of Advent is just enough time to cement a new religious resolution or habit into the liturgy of our lives and prayers around the Advent Wreath are an easy place to start that can help make the mystery of the Incarnation more tangible to every member of your family young and old. As our children grow, we started selecting individual religious resolutions for the coming year as part out our Catholic New Year's Eve festivities the night before Advent begins.

ADDING IN THE ADVENT WREATH

The Advent Wreath is traditionally lit at night, and preferably in the dark for the greatest effect on the senses and the soul alike. With most things the most painless way to remember to add something new into our hectic lives is by pinning it to or pairing it with something else your family already does habitually. For example, your family may decide to light your Advent Wreath before or after a meal like supper, or before bedtime.

Our family has our devotions before bed as a quiet close to the busy day. We light the week's candle(s), sing "People Look East," and the O Antiphon if during the Golden Nights, then say our Advent prayers. When over, we blow out the candles and, in the spirit of the Great Silence at the close of day in a monastery, head off to bed as pushed as possible with eight little ones in tow.

"People Look East" is an Advent carol written by the English children's author Eleanor Farjeon in 1920. Its tune is a traditional French carol tune

Prayers for the Advent Ember Tide

THE EMBER DAYS ARE A SET OF 3 DAYS PUT ASIDE EACH NATURAL SEASON FOR PRAYER, FASTING, ABSTINENCE, AND THANKSGIVING. ALWAYS ON WEDNESDAY, FRIDAY, AND SATURDAY; THE ADVENT EMBER DAYS FALL IMMEDIATELY AFTER THE FEAST OF ST. LUCY ON DECEMBER 13TH. THE WINTER EMBERTIDE GIVES THANKS FOR THE OLIVES GROWN TO MAKE THE HOLY OILS OF THE CHURCH. IT IS ALSO CUSTOMARY TO PRAY FOR PRIESTS AND VOCATIONS AT THIS TIME.

WEDNESDAY COLLECT

Grant, we beseech Thee, almighty God, that the coming solemnity of our redemption may both confer upon us assistance in this present life and bestow the rewards of everlasting blessedness. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, Thy Son, who liveth and reigneth in the unity of the Holy Ghost, God, world without end. Amen.

FRIDAY COLLECT

Stir up Thy might, we beseech Thee, Lord, and come: that they who trust in Thy loving kindness may be the more speedily freed from all adversity: Who livest and reignest with God the Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, forever and ever. Amen.

SATURDAY COLLECT

O God, who seest that we are afflicted because of our iniquity, mercifully grant that we may be comforted by Thy visitation: Who livest and reignest with God the Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, forever and ever. Amen.

from the 1800's called Besançon. Through each of the five verses of this festive hymn a different Messianic title of Christ is expounded upon as the anticipation for his coming builds in the text.

Some may wonder why we have music placed first in our devotions instead of prayer. In this case we have followed the example of the High Mass in that the first spiritual practice performed in community is the singing of a hymn. The exercise of singing first also helps signify that something different and special is taking place and creates the atmosphere for the remainder of the night's devotions.

For this booklet I have provided the text and downloadable recordings for "People Look East" and all the prayers we typically use throughout Advent. Our prayers include: The Blessing of the Advent wreath, the week's collect said every day, the St. Andrew Christmas Novena, the Alma Redemptoris Mater, and those prayers we add to the end of certain days for the Advent Ember Days. The daily collect, for feasts, is read from the missal. The History of the Advent Wreath

Thought by some to date back as far as the middle ages, the Advent Wreath is a simple and beautiful sacramental teaming with the theology and symbolism of the season. The circular shape of the wreath illustrates the eternal nature of God and model His presence in the Burning Bush. Meanwhile the evergreen boughs remind us of our souls' immortality and purpose of eternity with Him in heaven. The accompanying berries, seeds and pinecones are also a display of that hope for new life through Christ's resurrection.

The four candles of the Advent wreath are layered with meaning as well as they represent both the four millennia of salvation history before Christ's birth and the number of weeks that compose Advent. Each candle is also designated to a specific group or saint: the Patriarchs, the Prophets, St. John the Forerunner, and Our Lady.

Additionally the different positions of the four candles are of note with the South candle symbolizing Bethlehem, the North candle Jerusalem, the East candle the rising of the sun and the Second Coming of Christ, and the West candle for Jesus who overcomes all darkness as the Light of the World. There is also a virtue assigned to each candle: Hope for week one, then Faith, Joy, and Peace.

The violet and rose colors of the candles are significant in that they mirror the vestments worn each Sunday of the season and the spirit of that week. The violet vestments and candles bring to mind that Advent is a preparation a kin to a little lent for our souls. In contrast, the third Sunday, and midpoint, of Advent with the rose sacramentals of Gaudete Sunday serve as a visible reminder that we are all called to rejoice in the coming of our Lord.



Advent Marian Antiphon

SINCE THE 13TH CENTURY THIS ANTIPHON HAS BEEN CHANTED AS PART OF THE OFFICE OF COMPLINE. IT WAS WRITTEN IN THE 11TH CENTURY BY BLESSED HERMANN OF REICHENAU, A BENEDICTINE MONK ALSO KNOWN AS HERMAN CONTRACTUS. AND THE TEXT ITSELF WAS INSPIRED BY THE WORKS OF STS. EPIPHANIUS, FULGENTIUS, AND IRENAEUS. THIS ANTIPHON IS TRADITIONALLY PRAYED FROM THE BEGINNING OF ADVENT UNTIL CANDLEMAS ON FEBRUARY 2ND.

The violet vestments and candles bring to mind that Advent is a preparation akin to a little lent for our souls. In contrast, the third Sunday, and midpoint, of Advent with the rose sacramentals of Gaudete Sunday serve as a visible reminder that we are all called to rejoice in the coming of our Lord.

Although the colors of violet and rose are common among North American Catholics, all purple or even white candles are wholly acceptable alternatives. Similarly in Germany, red candles are often used as shown by the personal Advent Wreath of Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI.

Finally, the glow of the candles' flames depict the light of Christ himself and foreshadow His reign in heaven on the Great White Throne as King of Kings, at the end of time.

Christmas Novena

THERE ARE TWO METHODS OF PRAYING THE ST. ANDREW CHRISTMAS
NOVENA. THE FIRST BEGINS ON HIS FEAST DAY, NOVEMBER 30TH, AND
CONTINUES THROUGH CHRISTMAS EVE. THE SECOND WAY OF PRAYING
THIS PRAYER IS SIMILAR TO OTHER NOVENAS. IN THIS CASE IT
WOULD STARTS 9 DAYS BEFORE CHRISTMAS ON DECEMBER 16TH
AND ALSO END ON CHRISTMAS EVE. WITH BOTH FORMS THE
PRAYER IS SAID 15 TIMES A DAY. ASSIGNING THE LEADING
OF FIVE OF THE PRAYERS TO A SPECIFIC CHILD IS A SIMPLE
WAY TO KEEP UP WITH THEM AS THE CHILDREN CAN USE
THE FINGERS OF ONE HAND TO COUNT THEM OUT.

The Immaculate Conception Novena

THE SOLEMNITY OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION IS A HOLY DAY OF OBLIGATION. THIS TRADITIONAL NOVENA IS PRAYED FOR NINE DAYS BEGINNING ON NOVEMBER 29TH THROUGH DECEMBER 7TH. THE EVE OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION.

Immaculate Virgin! Mary, conceived without sin! Remember, thou wert miraculously preserved from even the shadow of sin, because thou wert destined to become not only the Mother of God, but also the mother, the refuge, and the advocate of man; generated therefore, with the most lively confidence in thy never-failing intercession, we most humbly implore thee to look with favor upon the intentions of this novena, and to obtain for us the graces and the favors we request. Thou knowest, O Mary, how often our hearts are the sanctuaries of God, Who abhors iniquity. Obtain for us, then, than angelic purity which was thy favorite virtue, that purity of heart which will attach us to God alone, and that purity of intention which will consecrate every thought, word, and action to His greater glory. Obtain also for us a constant spirit of prayer and self-denial, that we may recover by penance that innocence which we have lost by sin, and at length attain safety to that blessed abode of the saints, where nothing defiled can enter.

O Mary, conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to thee.
